New Library Update

Project Update

Plans to build a new Oregon Public Library can now move forward thanks to the generosity of the community and available funding. In February, the Village of Oregon increased their commitment to funding the new library to \$10 million. Nearly \$2.1 million was also donated by the community towards this important project. Funding from impact fees adds to the project budget. Thank you to all the Friends of the Library who have been involved in making this possible!

The Library Board is now working on hiring an Owner's Representative for the project. The next step will be to contract with an architect to continue to work on the design. We hope to have the project ready to put out to bid in early 2022!

Site Considerations

The site selected for the new library has many important elements that have to fit together on the new library site. Important considerations include storm water management, parking requirements, green space, and safe access for pedestrians, bikes and vehicles. In addition, making sure the new library fits into the neighborhood, makes best use of available funding, and provides for future growth are also key. With the size and shape of the property, getting all of these pieces to fit together is complicated.

Currently, the Village is exploring some option that could provide more flexibility to the site layout including 1) reviewing the Zoning code for appropriate updates, if any, to parking requirements, 2) exploring an agreement for offsite overflow parking, and 3) exploring potential purchase of additional property. The outcomes of these options will help determine possibilities for the layout of the new library site.

Successful Book Sale!

Friends of Oregon Library succeeded in presenting an unusual but triumphantly successful book sale May 8 in Oregon's open air Kiser Park Shelter. In addition to more than 31 hours of volunteer time from early April to the actual sale, FOL members brainstormed via e-mail about how to sort stored books outside using open cars and portable tables on April 10, how to publicized the sale, and how to be prepared if wet weather was on the sale date.

Enthusiastic book shoppers arrived before the sale started at 8 AM. How good it was to recognize shoppers, even with masks, whom we had not seen since Oct. 2019!

Even though books were priced considerably less than normal and thanks to many shoppers generously paying more than due, in only 5 hours \$983.00 was raised to support Oregon Library's reading programs for all ages!

When will the next book sale happen? That depends on if FOL is able to use a village park shelter again or if/when Oregon Library is able to safely return the Ames community room to public space as employees are able to return to their shared work spaces.

Donations of books for future sales will be accepted as soon as FOL's currently 100% full storage garage again has space. Until then, please store your potential donations in a dry, sturdy box. Thank you for your patience and support.

Summer Reading Program

June 7 to August 21, 2021

The Summer Library Program's 2021 theme is "Tails & Tales." We are encouraging readers of all ages to wag their tails down to the Oregon Public Library for some good tales! We have four age categories for our reading programs: Read to Me (0-4), Children (5-11), Teen (12-17), and Adult (18 and up). Each program asks participants to read, be read to, or listen to books of their choice along with fun activities to earn prizes and entry slips to their respective reading program's Grand Prize Drawing. Every child and teen who completes the program earn an envelope of coupons (Eugster's Farm, Madison Mallards, Pizza Hut, more) and a book.

We are using an online tracking program called Beanstack. How Beanstack can make summer reading easier!

- You can track reading and activities via the desktop version or mobile app!
- You can have ONE login for your family or group.
- In the mobile app, you can scan the book's barcode to enter them.
- Your account can be used to manage all Oregon Public Library reading pro-
